
Still Faithful after All These Years

Commitment. Commitment is a pledge or a binding by a person or an organization to a certain course or policy. It can also mean to be dedicated to something. As I began to look at Scripture, there seemed to be five key commitments emphasized.

Commitment 1: the commitment of our cause.

A cause is something important enough that someone needs to say something about it as well as do something about it. Remember when David saw Goliath cursing God and the people of God? What did David say? "Is there not a cause?" (1 Samuel 17:29).

Have you noticed that when you stand up for God, sometimes those around you will turn on you in that situation. But David said, "Is there not a cause?"

Commitment 2: commit our way.

Psalm 37:5 says, "Commit your way to the LORD." The idea is for us to turn over the direction of our lives and make the Lord the leader. Commit our way to Him. Let Him make the decision about where to go.

Commitment 3: commit our works to the Lord.

Whatever we do, we do it heartily unto the Lord—worshiping God, studying God's Word, and praying—as we are told in Colossians 3:23.

Commitment 4: commit your souls to the Lord.

As we face the hardships and the joys of life, we need to commit our souls to our faithful Creator (1 Peter 4:19).


Commitment 5: commit our spirit to the Lord.

While the soul tends to be more connected to the earth and horizontal relationships, the spirit is more focused on our vertical relationship with God. Jesus' very last words as He walked this life in human flesh were, "Into Your hands I commit My spirit."

Ecclesiastes 4:9–12 impacted me as to the importance of not going it alone in ministry.
